
HIV/AIDS: How many more?



- Every minute a child under the age of 15 dies from AIDS or AIDS related illness.
- Every 15 seconds a young adult between 15 and 24 becomes infected with HIV.
- Only 1 percent of children have access to Coltrimoxazole which costs less than 3 cents a day.
- 11,000 new HIV infections and 8,000deaths daily.
- HIV/AIDS has killed more than 25 million people since 1981.
- 38.6 million people are living with this disease which is now classified as a pandemic.
- A third of all deaths occur in sub-Saharan Africa. 2.3 million children are

living with HIV. Ninety percent of new child HIV infections are in sub-Saharan Africa.

- In 2005, around 380,000 children died of AIDS and 540,000 children got newly infected.
- Over 15 million children have lost one or both parents to AIDS - more than the total number of children in Britain.





- 70,000 children under 15 have HIV/AIDS in India.
- Women represent 59% of the infected population in sub-Saharan Africa.
- Left graph: changes in life expectancy in some hard-hit African countries.
- The world bank states: "While HIV/AIDS is clearly a health problem, the world has come to realize it is also a development problem that threatens human welfare, socio-economic advances, productivity, social cohesion, and even national security. HIV/AIDS reaches into every corner of society, affecting parents, children and youth, teachers and health workers, rich and poor

ACTION: Congress: Deliver on Health Care for Those Who Need it Most! Dear [Decision Maker],

You will soon be voting on a bill that could improve our health care system for children, older Americans, and those with little income. If passed, the Children's Health And Medicare Protection (CHAMP) Act would reduce excess payments to Medicare Advantage plans and instead use that money to give low-income Medicare beneficiaries access to medicines they cannot afford. It would reduce the asset test in Medicare Part D and streamline the application process, thereby helping millions of Americans gain access to affordable healthcare. It would also ensure that physicians who treat Medicare patients are paid fairly for their services. Last, the CHAMP Act would reauthorize and strengthen the State Children's Health Insurance Program so more low-income children have access to affordable healthcare.

As your constituent, I urge you to do the right thing by voting "Yes" on the CHAMP Act! Thank you for your consideration on this and other important issues. I am looking forward to learning how you vote on this matter.
